What does a day in the life of an EPS student look like?



The EPS schedule is designed for depth of experience, ample transition time, and opportunities to connect with peers and teachers. Four class periods meet each day out of a total of eight class periods, one or more of which is a study hall or free period. Class period order reverses on days three and four of our four-day rotation, balancing natural cognitive differences for teenagers between the morning and afternoon.

Each EPS student has their own unique schedule. Here are examples of a potential sixth and ninth graders' schedules: Classes are seventy minutes long with fifteen minute passing periods between them. An optional "Zero (0)" Period for Upper School students takes place Tuesday through Friday from 7:30-8:15 a.m. for Chamber Music Ensemble and Chamber Choir.

The EPS Experience

Supporting All Learners

We believe that all individuals have strengths and areas of challenge, so at EPS, learner variability is the norm, with no particular "right" way of thinking or learning. We approach challenges with curiosity and compassion, working collaboratively with students and faculty as inevitable challenges arise through the learning process.

- Students with a wide variety of learning profiles successfully navigate our rigorous and challenging academic curriculum. All students benefit from a study hall or free period in their schedule to accomplish out-of-class assignments in a supportive environment, and our fee-based **Guided Study Hall** program further supports students through a 4:1 student to learning support specialist ratio and encourages students to develop personalized learning tools.
- All students can participate in meaningful, challenging learning opportunities, therefore all students deserve equitable access to instruction and content. One in four students receives accommodations to support them in their learning.
- Three full-time school counselors support our students through 1:1 meetings as well as the development and leadership programs enhancing students' social and emotional learning.

Fostering Independence

The 'prep' in Eastside Prep is not just about preparing for college, but all aspects of learning throughout life. Students become independent adults when given both choices and support, so our program includes numerous options for all students along with the encouragement to try new and challenging pursuits.

- In fifth through twelfth grades, students choose **elective courses** each trimester, including arts and physical education offerings.
- Upper School students have seminar options beginning in tenth grade as well as independent study options beginning in eleventh grade.
- Co-curricular after-school program options include academic teams, theatrical productions, and sports teams.
- Upper School students elect a Student Leadership Council (SLC) each year. SLC leads assemblies, plans student-led activities, and serves as a voice for their peers.

Cultivating Belonging

When students feel a sense of belonging, they are encouraged to be their authentic selves and to help others do the same. During their time at EPS, students develop an understanding the diverse world around them. By acknowledging and addressing marginalization, students create a better world—starting right here at school. Equity, Inclusion and Compassionate Leadership (EICL) encompasses our school values of diversity and belonging, along with all programs stewarded by our EICL co-coordinators.

- Connecting through affinity groups, individuals with common identities celebrate joys and address challenges in optional, facilitated communities. These are arranged by Middle School (monthly), Upper School (bi-weekly), and Faculty/Staff (monthly).
- ▶ **Living our mission** at the intersection of critical thinking, responsible action, and compassionate leadership entails courageous conversations, particularly in our classrooms, where knowledge and understanding continually evolve.
- Striving for deeper connections as a community, our Culture Night, family affinity gatherings, and EICL community conversations all help to align student experiences between school and home.

Fifth and sixth grade students learn math with their grade level classmates through differentiated instruction. Our program encompasses math fluency, habits of mind, and application of concepts. Middle School math is not simply about achievement, and we do not prioritize acceleration for acceleration's sake. Diagnostic tools are used, along with prior school information, to identify areas of strength and potential growth in math. Holistic, math teacher-led interviews are conducted with all incoming students to assess their math fluency and computational skills.

Faculty-designed, student-fueled

- Facilitated by a faculty member or faculty pair, with guest presenters invited based on particular knowledge/experience.
- ▶ Six fifty-minute sessions (meeting once per week).

Independent Study | Project (11-12)

Student-designed and fueled

- Students design, propose, and pursue an independent course of study with the support of a faculty mentor.
- ► Ten fifty-minute sessions with faculty mentor, once a week.
- Work outside of sessions is preparation for independent research at the collegiate level.
- Starts in eleventh grade spring trimester.

Senior Thesis (12)

Student-designed and fueled

- Students expand the scope of research from a previous independent study, engage in new, original research, or combine both previous and new research.
- Five fifty-minute sessions with faculty mentor, once a week.
- Work outside of sessions is preparation for independent research and production at the collegiate level.
- Two Independent Studies of exceptional quality are a prerequisite to a Senior Thesis.

Students can begin experiencing the Upper School independent curriculum in tenth grade, with options for independent study starting at the end of eleventh grade.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION (PE) PROGRAMS

The mission of the Eastside Prep PE Program is to inspire, prepare, and encourage students to develop a positive attitude toward participation in physical activity and healthy living. In addition to group PE courses, we offer:

- ▶ PE Wellness, where students learn how the body works to keep it healthy (required for all ninth graders).
- Customized Training to Maximize Performance to track and achieve personal fitness goals, and Yoga to cultivate brain-body connections.
- ▶ Sports practiced during the school day with occasional games after school (fifth/sixth grades); participation in after school athletics teams in lieu of PE classes (Upper School).

CREATIVE SPACES

In addition to their arts elective courses (see Curriculum Maps on pages 5 to 8), students enjoy exploring their creativity throughout campus:

LEARNING THROUGH EXPERIENCE & EDUCATION BEYOND THE CLASSROOM (EBC)

Learning through experience is a component of all EPS courses, and excursions beyond campus support a deeper integration of knowledge.

- All students attend a two-day orientation at the start of school, featuring overnight stays for sixth, ninth, and twelfth grades.
- Service opportunities deepen students' understanding of the needs, issues and problems facing their community and the world, empowering students to understand their roles in meeting those needs, addressing those issues, and solving those problems.
- During Culture Night, EPS families share experience-oriented exhibits and learn from others as they laugh, sing, eat, and dance together.
- ▶ Education Beyond the Classroom (EBC) offers a wide variety of week-long experiences focused on arts, science, history, culture, the environment, and service.
- ► Field trips to the Seattle Aquarium, King County Courthouse, Seattle Asian Art Museum (and many more locations!) enhance student learning.

College Counseling

Overview

At EPS, students drive their college process with the support and empowerment of a team of professionals dedicated to their success. Members of the College Counseling team all work with students in other roles at the school: they have coached, traveled with, taught and advised students before guiding them through their college-finding journey. They have firsthand insights into each student's character and interests. In our unique model, students are assigned both a college process coach and writing coach. The Associate Head of School for College Counseling and Alumni Relations supports all families in the college process.

Process

Students are guided by their Process Coach to complete each of these steps:

- ▶ Engage in extensive self-reflection with the goal of developing and continually refining a list of criteria important to the student's college search.
- Gain awareness of colleges and universities beyond the student's own experience.
- Learn effective strategies for researching schools in order to build, refine, and finalize the college list, including awareness of financial aid and merit scholarship opportunities.
- Plan for campus visits, conduct mock interviews, and prepare for interactions with college admissions representatives.
- Develop a standardized testing plan.
- Maintain strong communication through regular family meetings and frequent one-on-one meetings throughout the process.
- Compile, complete, and submit applications.
- Evaluate and make final decisions about matriculation, including financial aid award options.

Writing

Students are guided by their Writing Coach to complete each of these steps:

- Understand the purpose of college admissions essays through mock admissions examples.
- ▶ Reflect on their own unique characteristics and story with the help of brainstorming activities and personal conversations.
- Generate potential writing topics.
- Draft and edit personal statements and supplements.
- Refine and complete college application writing that demonstrates their writing ability and more importantly, who they are and what they care about.

Events

Students participate in these college counseling events:

- Visit two local universities in the tenth grade.
- ▶ Take the PSAT and practice ACT.
- Attend a mock admissions night for families.
- Attend four college counseling nights for families.
- Attend workshops to receive support from college counselors on the college process and application work.
- ▶ Meet with college admission officers who visit EPS (we host more than 100 of them each fall).
- ▶ Travel on optional college tours through Education Beyond the Classroom (EBC) trips.

Test Prep

To help students prepare for the ACT and SAT, students have the opportunity to take a practice PSAT and ACT in tenth grade. In the fall of their junior year, students take the PSAT on campus, which also serves as the qualifying test for the National Merit Scholarship Program. The table below shows the middle 50% of scores from the EPS Classes of 2021, 2022, and 2023 for both the ACT and the SAT.
